Where in the Biblical Timeline?


- 1400 BC Entering "Promised Land"

- 930 BC Kingdom Divides: Israel (north) and Judah (south)




First Four Kings of Judah: Rehoboam, Abijah, Asa, Jehoshaphat



Jehoshaphat in 2 Chronicles 17-20



1) Jehoshaphat leads the people to <u>follow God</u>.



2 Chronicles 17:3-6


- The LORD was with Jehoshaphat because he followed the example of his father David's earlier days and did not seek the Baals,
- ⁴ but sought the God of his father, followed His commandments, and did not act as Israel did.

2 Chronicles 17:3-6

- ⁵ So the LORD established the kingdom in his control, and all Judah brought tribute to Jehoshaphat, and he had great riches and honor.
- ⁶ He took great pride in the ways of the LORD and again removed the high places and the Asherim from Judah.

1) Jehoshaphat leads the people to follow God.



-He appoints <u>teachers</u> and <u>judges</u> to lead the people toward God.

2 Chronicles 17:7-9

Then in the third year of his reign <u>he</u> sent his officials, Ben-hail, Obadiah, Zechariah, Nethanel and Micaiah, <u>to</u> teach in the cities of Judah;

2 Chronicles 17:7-9

⁹ They taught in Judah, having the book of the law of the LORD with them; and they went throughout all the cities of Judah and taught among the people.


2 Chronicles 19:5-7

- ⁵ He <u>appointed judges</u> in the land in all the fortified cities of Judah, city by city.
- ⁶ He said to the judges, "Consider what you are doing, for you do not judge for man but for the LORD who is with you when you render judgment.


2 Chronicles 19:5-7

⁷ Now then let the fear of the LORD be upon you; be very careful what you do, for the LORD our God will have no part in unrighteousness or partiality or the taking of a bribe."

2) Jehoshaphat gets too close to <u>Ahab</u>.



2) Jehoshaphat gets too close to Ahab.




- They are allied by marriage.

¹ Now Jehoshaphat had great riches and honor; and he allied himself by marriage with Ahab.

2 Chronicles 21:5-6

- ⁵ Jehoram *was* thirty-two years old when he became king, and he reigned eight years in Jerusalem.
- ⁶ He walked in the way of the kings of Israel, just as the house of Ahab did (for Ahab's daughter was his wife), and he did evil in the sight of the LORD.

2) Jehoshaphat gets too close to Ahab.



- He goes to battle with Ahab.

² Some years later he went down to visit Ahab at Samaria. And Ahab slaughtered many sheep and oxen for him and the people who were with him, and induced him to go up against Ramoth-gilead.

³ Ahab king of Israel said to Jehoshaphat king of Judah, "Will you go with me against Ramoth-gilead?" And he said to him, "I am as you are, and my people as your people, and we will be with you in the battle."

- ²⁸ So the king of Israel and Jehoshaphat king of Judah went up against Ramothgilead.
- The king of Israel said to Jehoshaphat, "I will disguise myself and go into battle, but you put on your robes." So the king of Israel disguised himself, and they went into battle.

Now the king of Aram had commanded the captains of his chariots, saying, "Do not fight with small or great, but with the king of Israel alone."


31 So when the captains of the chariots saw Jehoshaphat, they said, "It is the king of Israel," and they turned aside to fight against him. But Jehoshaphat cried out, and the LORD helped him, and God diverted them from him.

When the captains of the chariots saw that it was not the king of Israel, they turned back from pursuing him.

³³ A certain man drew his bow at random and struck the king of Israel in a joint of the armor. So he said to the driver of the chariot, "Turn around and take me out of the fight, for I am severely wounded."

The battle raged that day, and the king of Israel propped himself up in his chariot in front of the Arameans until the evening; and at sunset he died.

2) Jehoshaphat gets too close to Ahab.




- God rebukes him for this.

² Jehu the son of Hanani the seer went out to meet him and said to King Jehoshaphat, "Should you help the wicked and love those who hate the LORD and so bring wrath on yourself from the LORD?

³ But there is *some* good in you, for you have removed the Asheroth from the land and you have set your heart to seek God."

3) Jehoshaphat <u>trusts</u> God, and God gives them a great <u>victory</u>.



2 Chronicles 20:1-2

¹ Now it came about after this that the sons of Moab and the sons of Ammon, together with some of the Meunites, came to make war against Jehoshaphat.

2 Chronicles 20:3-4

- ³ Jehoshaphat was afraid and turned his attention to seek the LORD, and proclaimed a fast throughout all Judah.
- ⁴ So Judah gathered together to seek help from the LORD; they even came from all the cities of Judah to seek the LORD.

2 Chronicles 20:5-6

⁵ Then Jehoshaphat stood in the assembly of Judah and Jerusalem, in the house of the LORD before the new court,

2 Chronicles 20:5-6

⁶ and he said, "O LORD, the God of our fathers, are You not God in the heavens? And are You not ruler over all the kingdoms of the nations? Power and might are in Your hand so that no one can stand against You.

2 Chronicles 20:12

¹² O our God, will You not judge them? For we are powerless before this great multitude who are coming against us; nor do we know what to do, but our eyes are on You."

2 Chronicles 20:15,17

¹⁵ and he [Jahaziel] said, "Listen, all Judah and the inhabitants of Jerusalem and King Jehoshaphat: thus says the LORD to you, 'Do not fear or be dismayed because of this great multitude, for the battle is not yours but God's.


2 Chronicles 20:15,17

¹⁷ You *need* not fight in this *battle*; station yourselves, stand and see the salvation of the LORD on your behalf, O Judah and Jerusalem.' Do not fear or be dismayed; tomorrow go out to face them, for the LORD is with you."

2 Chronicles 20:31-32

31 Now Jehoshaphat reigned over Judah. He was thirty-five years old when he became king, and he reigned in Jerusalem twenty-five years. ... ³² He walked in the way of his father Asa and did not depart from it, doing right in the sight of the LORD.

1) The importance of teaching.



2) We must not let <u>relationships</u> pull us away from <u>God</u>.


2 Corinthians 6:14
